# UN-GGIM

ECOSOC established the Committee of Experts as the apex intergovernmental mechanism for making joint decisions and setting directions with regard to the production, availability and use of geospatial information within national, regional and global policy frameworks. Led by United Nations Member States, UN-GGIM aims to address global challenges regarding the use of geospatial information, including in the development agendas, and to serve as a body for global policymaking in the field of geospatial information management.





**The Commission is steered by a group of 27 Commissioners, known as 'the college'**

- Each Commissioner will ensure **the delivery of the UN Sustainable Development Goals** within their policy area. The College as a whole will be responsible for the overall implementation of the Goals.
- Along with close relations with the Council, need to strengthen the Commission's **special partnership with the European Parliament**. This priority must cut through the work of each Member of the College.
- 'One In, One Out principle'**: Every legislative proposal creating new burdens should relieve people and businesses of an equivalent existing burden at EU level in the same policy area. Work with MS to ensure that, when transposing EU legislation, they do not add unnecessary administrative burdens.

- Council of the EU single legal entity, meets in **10 different 'configurations'**, depending on the subject; negotiates and adopts legislative acts in trialogue; supported by the **Coreper** and more than **150 highly specialised working parties and committees**, - 'Council preparatory bodies' set up by the treaties, intergov decisions or by Council act, mostly permanent and an appointed or elected chairperson; Committees and working parties **set up by Coreper** - these deal with very specific subjects and are chaired by the delegate of the country holding the rotating presidency. (WP on Telecommunication & Information society currently discuss on e-privacy...) **List of members of WP not publicly available**. In addition, **ad hoc** committees can be created for a specific purpose and cease to exist when their task is fulfilled.



Contribution to EU policy and law-making by giving feedback on Commission initiatives as they take shape or making suggestions on simplifying and improving existing laws.

Transparency Registration vests direct access to react online on:

- ❖ Initial ideas – Roadmaps and inception impact assessments
- ❖ Gathering evidence – Public consultations
- ❖ Legislative proposals – Providing input before the law becomes final
- ❖ Technical rules or updates – Draft delegated and implementing acts
- ❖ Simplifying and improving existing laws - Lighten the load

# Committees: expert group & comitology

## Commission expert group:

consultative body set up by the Comm or its departments composed of public and/or private sector members which meets more than once.

**formal**- set up by Commission decision and

**informal**- set up by an individual Comm department that has obtained the agreement of the Commissioner and Vice-President responsible and of the Secretariat-General.

Experts groups are not the Commission's only source of expert input.

When gathering the full range of views on an issue, it also has recourse to studies, European agencies, green papers, public consultations, hearings, and so on.

Overall stakeholder participation and representation should therefore always be seen in the light of all the initiatives the Commission takes.

## Comitology committees:

are made up of representatives of each EU Member State

are set up by the legislator when legislator empowers the Commission to adopt implementing legislation subject to the scrutiny of MS. The mechanisms for exercising scrutiny, set out in the Comitology Regulation, involve comitology committees.







# Essential Differences

- National position – this is for you
- We will inform you to help, and might try to influence you, or help you inform and influence your government,
- but we respect your national position and role and will not interfere.
- EG will develop shared technical or policy positions. A collective and shared view, developed by you and in collaboration with you.
- Sometimes it is not possible to get a shared view – and to do so would water down our influence or clarity
- Therefore, EG will express its own professional view on topics of interest. This may not be your individual views. If so we will inform stakeholders of the different views that exists.
- (This may be useful in some instances – it keeps distance and lets you influence without being seen to take a different view from your governments)

# What EGHO will do

- EGHO has two key roles:
  - Secretariat
  - Representation
- **Secretariat:**
  - Organises meeting and webinars
  - Distributes agenda and papers
  - Drafts minutes
  - Provides information
- **Representation:**
  - Tracks policy developments
  - Informs members of policy developments at EU and UN level
  - Prepares EG policy positions and briefings
  - Liaises, communicates and briefs EC officials, EU Parliamentary interests
  - Liaises, communicates and briefs UN Secretariat, Committee of Experts
  - Acts as Observer on UN-GGIM Europe Ex-Committee
  - Liaises and informs with other International bodies of interest.

# What we would like members to do

- Proactively engage with policy and representation (at the most senior levels)
- Support EG in undertaking its representation role
- Including by attending meetings to support EGHO in its communication; leading on specific topics of interest to members
- Ensure we are aware and represent EG positions the same way
- Explain your National perspectives, concerns and positions
- Liaise with your National representative
- Brief and inform your National representative of organisational and EG positions
- Briefs and inform EG of your National position (where appropriate)
- Briefs, informs and engages with EC and EU Parliamentary interests, where appropriate, and feedback to EGHO and POLKEN on developments and meetings
